Dear Friends,

In each group or institution there has to be a set of principles to govern the organization. Without such principles the organization will lose its purpose and eventually fail. This is true of all organizations: schools, businesses, governmental institutions, and yes, also churches.

Many consider the by-laws of a church to be the guiding principles but that is only partially true. Long before by-laws are written the purpose of the institution has to be considered. Where do we find that for a church?

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

Before any by-laws or creeds were needed to be written down to govern how the church would function, the church had to learn how to be a community. They had to learn what it meant to be a "we" rather than a "me."

As a community, a "we," they learned how to devote themselves to the teaching of the apostles, to live together in fellowship, to be attentive to the needs of others, to make self-sacrifices for the sake of the common good, and to live with an intense devotion to the mission of Christ. They could do all of this because they understood what it meant to be a community, a "we." They lived in awe of all of this. I'm not sure when or how it happened but eventually the "awe" was lost. The church forgot how to be a "we" and became a "me." Within the Church grew internal conflicts, persecutions, and inter-faith tensions. The Church went from being a strong community to a fledging community.

How did this happen?

As much as I believe in following the Apostle Paul's instructions to do "All things decently and in order," write Faith Statements, Purpose Statements, Mission Statements, and follow Robert's Rules of Orders I sometimes believe that all of the guiding tools can stand in the way of being a community, a "WE!"

Guiding documents and principles are essential to maintain order and accountability but so is freedom in order to maintain community. I think we need both.

The Caring Place

Once again this year we will be **gathering school supplies** for the The Caring Place in Allentown. As a reminder, TCP is a safe afternoon program for all school-age children until parents get home after



work. While there, the children receive help with homework and school projects. School supplies of all kinds are needed like paper, pencils, markers, glue sticks, poster board, construction paper, notebooks, folders, etc. Before you know it, Back-To-School Specials will be everywhere. Pick up a few items and deliver them to Faith Church.

A bin will be placed in the Narthex clearly marked for school supplies beginning the first Sunday in August.

Beyond Borders Family Sponsorship

Faith's pledge to Beyond Borders to sponsor 3 families during the last cohort on Laganov Island, Haiti has been completed. This commitment amounted to a giving amount of \$5,400. Many generous Faith Church families pledged to make it possible for each Haitian family to receive \$1,800. Our commitment went from January 2022 through June 2023. All pledges have been met. When we receive information on the families' graduation from the program we will share that with you.

~If it crunches when squeezed throw it in the trash.


~All plastic must be clean and dry.



Use simple ingredients and your imagination to bake these fluffy, cloud-like treats.

What you need:

- 3 egg whites
- ½ tsp. vanilla extract
- Mixer
- 1 Tbsp. cornstarch
- Parchment paper

What you do:

- Preheat oven to 300°. In a mixing bowl, combine egg whites and vanilla. Mix at medium speed until frothy.
- 2. While whisking, gradually add sugar and cornstarch. Keep whisking at high speed until stiff peaks form.
- 3. Spoon mixture onto a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Create fun shapes.
- 4. Bake 20 minutes. Cool and enjoy!
