### Dear Friends,

In a previous article I told you how my new (to me, that is) car has many safety features that are new to me and are a bit surprising. For example, if I get too close the edge of the road an alarm rings, the steering wheel vibrates, and the words "Lane departure. Steering required" appears on my dashboard. I'm pretty sure I told you all about this. I think the alarm, the vibrating steering wheel, and the words "Land Departure" on the dash are helpful and wise but do I really need to be told that I must steer the car? I keep hearing about driverless cars in our future, but I don't think we're there yet.

Anyway, I recently received a new and somewhat surprising message on my dashboard. I'm developing quite a relationship with this car! A few weeks ago, I was driving home from a 3-day seminar in Rockville, MD. I was heading east on I-78 about an hour west of Allentown. I stopped at a rest stop to stretch my legs and treat myself to a soda and a bag of chips and then I continued on the last leg of my journey home.

It wasn't long before I got that new message. Across the dash were the words: *Driver Fatigued. Take a break!* appeared along with the picture of a cup of coffee.

So, here are my questions:

- 1. Why does my car think I'm fatigued after I just had a break?
- 2. How can my car *think* anything?
- 3. Even if I was fatigued, how could my car tell? Can it measure my pulse through the steering wheel? Count the number of times I

blink my eyes through the rear-view mirror?

4. Why is my car offering me a cup of coffee? If my car is *that* smart it should know that I drink *tea*, not coffee! When I walk into any Starbucks in the Lehigh Valley all the baristas know to make me a Chai Latte, skim, no water, no foam, extra hot please!

While I don't know how my car knows how to take such good care of me or how to watch over me, I'm glad that it can and does. I know that there are engineers, designers, service managers, and mechanics who know how all this works but to me it is a mystery.

There are times when faith is a mystery to us. We are told to believe things that don't make any sense. Take the Trinity for example. How can God be three (Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer) and yet one? Take the Incarnation, something that we are about to celebrate this month, as another example. How can Jesus be fully divine and fully human? These things, and many others, are a mystery to us.

Mystery is often hard to embrace as truth and yet it is essential to live a life of faith. At its core mystery is about trust. Do we trust God or not? It's as simple as that. A friend of mine who struggles with faith in God once said to me: "Bruce, you have to admit that it is hard to believe in all of this." My response was: "I suppose it is, but it becomes easier when you can embrace mystery and rely on trust."

I don't know how my car can tell that I'm fatigued and suggested that I take a break but I'm glad it can. I don't know how God can be three yet one but I know that I need someone to create, redeem, and sustain so I am glad this is true and I don't know how God could leave the heavenly realm and dwell with us as Jesus because I need a savior. I don't know how it happens, I'm just glad that it does. I'm perfectly comfortable with mystery.




During Advent, which begins this year on December 3, many churches and families use wreaths to symbolize watchfulness and increasing joy as Christmas approaches. Colors for the candles vary, with some traditions using blue (for hope or creation) and others preferring purple (for royalty, humility or penitence).

The four candles that each represent a week in Advent also signify hope, peace, joy and love. (The third candle is often pink.) In the center is the white Christ candle, representing Jesus as the light of the world. That candle is lit on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

The round, green Advent wreath has special meaning of its own. It symbolizes eternal life and the unending love of God, who sent his only Son to earth to die in our place.


### Hello Karen!

Use magnet tiles to build designs atop the light box. Try building a 3-D Christmas tree!
