A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR



Dear Friends,

What do the following companies have in common with each other?

FaceBook
Intel
Tesla
Google
ebay
in
Zipcar
Kraft
Colgate
AT&T
Chobani
Pfizer
duolingo

At a quick glance, I depend on eight of these thirteen companies. I may not drive a Tesla but I buy and sell on ebay, when I need to buy yogurt its always Chobani, and ever since I was a boy I have always used Colgate toothpaste. So, what do all 13 companies have in common?

They were all started, at least in part, by immigrants.

There are reasons why the church should be addressing immigration. One reason is economic, and the others are theological/justice related issues. While I am better versed at theology/justice issues than I am at economics, the two are connected so I will do my best to address both. As I dive into this issue let me stress that I am speaking of DOCUMENTED IMMI-GRATION in this article. I will not use the terms legal or illegal because we are talking about human beings and humans are neither "legal" or "illegal." In terms of immigration, they are either documented or nondocumented. That said, here we go, buckle your seat belt!

Did you know that thirty-six percent of all patents in the United States

last year were filed by immigrants? Twenty-three percent came from immigrants and thirteen percent came through partnerships between immigrants and natural born Americans. The contributions of immigrants to the American economy are staggering. We need immigrants.

An immigrant is 80% more likely to start a new business than a natural born American. We need immigrants.

But do immigrants create more crime than natural born Americans? NO! Studies show that whether you are talking about violent crimes, property related crimes, or drug violations natural born Americans commit more crimes than Documented or Non-Documented Immigrants. We need immigrants.

When it comes to immigration we need to move away from a villain/victim or a fear or pity mentality. The facts simply don't support them. And yet many hold on to the thinking that immigrants are here to hurt us, they are here to steal our jobs, and they are to be feared and pitied. There is nothing new about this. My grandfather told me of signs he saw in shop windows: *Help Wanted; Irish Need Not Apply.* These sentiments have come up in every era of immigration, and they are running high now.

So, I am done with the economic or historic portion of this article. Onto the theological/justice related portion.

We are a country of immigrants. While not everyone residing in America is a Christian, the sacred texts of our faith orders us to show special welcome to the "stranger in our midst."

""When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native -born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God. ~ Leviticus 19:33 – 34

For many years God's people were nomads, traveling from one place to the next, seeking safety, hospitality, and refuge in foreign lands. They were strangers and they were welcomed by strangers. As we wrestle with the plight of immigrants in our time the character of our God and our faith demands that we show the same welcome that our ancestors in faith received when they sought grace and mercy.

Immigrants deserve our grace and mercy.

'Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'

"Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me no drink, I was a stranger, and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not clothe me, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' ~ Matthew 25:37 – 43

These words of Jesus tell us that it is our Christian responsibility to welcome the stranger and that nations that fail to do so will be judged as such.

So, are you thinking that I believe in open boarders? Not at all. I believe in secure borders with mercy, that are just and are humble.

And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God. ~ Micah 6:8

Right now, I believe we have broken borders and not because we haven't finished building a "wall." I believe our border problem is because we are failing to *welcome the stranger*. Our immigration policies do not meet an international problem. The need for workers in this country has increased yet the number of documented immigrations we will accept has not changed since 1990 - 35 years ago.

I believe in borders that will speak to the needs of everyone on either side of the border providing food for the hungry, water for the thirsty, shelter for the homeless, clothes for the naked, medicine for the sick, and comfort and company for those who are lonely or have been impris-

oned. It will be to the extent that we do these things that we, our church, our community, our nation, and our world will be judged.

Who are the strangers in our midst? They are the people who show up at Betty Lou's Pantry for food. They are the people who call the Samaritans Fund seeking shelter. They are the children at the Caring Place who need notebooks, binders, crayons, pencils, and backpacks for school. They are the people who show up at a soup kitchen in Allentown or Bethlehem to receive a hot and nutritious meal. They are the teens of the LGBTQ+ community whose lives have become so unbearable due to judgement and rejection that they are considering harming themselves because they don't know of any other way to make the pain stop until they pick up a phone and dial the Trevor Project. These are just some of the strangers in our midst and sometimes it is just easier to look in the opposite direction when we are confronted by their presence.

But remember this: A stranger stays a stranger as long as both parties are standing on either side of the wall.

Welcome the stranger.
